



Reading Suggestions

Key Stage 2

There is a huge range of excellent fiction for the 7 - 11 year age range. These lists for each year group list just a few and many cross the year group boundaries. Some may look too young but the length of a book can be deceptive. Some feature more illustration than text: illustration can be as important in the telling of a story as words and will introduce children to key illustrators.

There are also plenty of series that are perfect for this age range, with various good authors writing in the same format, getting children used to books that are not too long but which are of guaranteed quality: *Banana Books, Colour Jets* (illustrated here), *Jets, Seriously Silly Stories, Collins Shivery Storybooks, Corgi Pups, Books for Boys, Sprinters, Young Puffins* etc.




Some authors such as Jacqueline Wilson and Malorie Blackman write across the age range and some of their titles are more suited to older children than those in Middle Years.

The Harry Potter series is well known and not included in these lists. Children can try it out at any stage, though at Year 3, it might be better to read it with the child.

Year 4 (age 8-9)




Year 4 students should be picking from our class libraries in order to progress their reading. While the children may feel that reading longer books is a better progression, reading lots of shorter books is very helpful for their creative English, as they experience new vocabulary, characters and places.

If your child is a competent reader or has read all these titles then try the books from the Year 5 list. Alternatively, if these books are a little challenging, try books from the Year 3 list.


The Harry Potter series is well known and not included in these lists. Children can try it out at any stage, though it might be better to read parts with the child.

An Elephant in the Garden Michael Morpurgo



Araminta Spook: My Haunted House Angie Sage



Billionaire Boy <mark>*</mark> David Walliams



Charlotte's Web E. B. White



Fergus Crane Paul Stewart, Chris Riddell

FERGUS CRANE! YOU ARE IN GREAT DANGER! I AM SENDING HELP. Signed T. C., your long-lost Uncle Theo. Fergus Crane has an almost ordinary life - having lessons taught by rather odd teachers on the school ship Betty Jeanne, helping his mother in the bakery. But then a mysterious flying box appears at the window of his waterfront home - and Fergus is plunged headlong into an exciting adventure! The box is followed by a winged mechanical horse that whisks him off to meet his long-lost uncle and his penguin helpers, Finn, Bill and Jackson. Fergus finds out that his teachers are not quite what they seem - they're actually pirates! Can Fergus and his winged horse save his schoolmates from the far-off Fire Island? And who else will he find there...?



George's Secret Key to the Universe Lucy Hawking, Stephen Hawking

Take a rollercoaster ride through the vastness of space and, in the midst of an exciting adventure, discover the mysteries of physics, science and the universe with George, his new friends next door - the scientist Eric and his daughter, Annie - and a super-intelligent computer called Cosmos, which can take them to the edge of a black hole and back again. Gobbolino the Witch's Cat Ursula Moray Williams

Gobbolino by Ursula Moray Williams is the charming tale of a witch's cat who would rather be a kitchen cat. Gobbolino has one white paw and blue eyes and isn't wicked at all, so his mother doesn't like him. He escapes to look for a kitchen home but is distrusted everywhere he goes and blamed for mysterious happenings, such as the farmer's milk turning sour and the orphanage children's gruel turning into chocolate.

Greta Zargo and the Death Robots from Outer Space A F Harrold



Meanwhile, in outer space a huge space-going robot is heading towards Earth to take over our planet. The two stories zing along in parallel before coming together beautifully at the book's climax, and thanks to another typo on a key document. The comical characters and situations will thoroughly entertain young readers while the author's delight in words and language adds another dimension.



How to Train Your Dragon <mark>*</mark> Cressida Cowell

Read the books that inspired the *How to Train Your Dragon* films! This book will be a hit with children and adults alike. The story begins in the first volume of Hiccup's How to Train Your Dragon memoirs...

Hiccup Horrendous Haddock III was an awesome sword-fighter, a dragon-whisperer and the greatest Viking Hero who ever lived. But it wasn't always like that. In fact, in the beginning, Hiccup Horrendous Haddock III was the most put upon Viking you'd ever seen. Not loud enough to make himself heard at dinner with his father, Stoick the Vast; not hard enough to beat his chief rival, Snotlout, at Bashyball, the number one school sport and CERTAINLY not stupid enough to go into a cave full of dragons to find a pet....It's time for Hiccup to learn how to be a Hero.




I am David Anne Holm


Just So Stories Rudyard Kipling, Jonathan Stroud



Martin 'Horrible Histories illustrator' Brown celebrates a host of animals that deserve to be better know, in a book that offers a refreshingly different approach to natural history. Each page is packed with fascinating information, cleverly laid out with frequent jokes and cartoon asides adding to the fun. At the same time, there's a serious message about the threat to these creatures from humans, and habitat loss.



Lost! The Hundred-Mile-An-Hour Dog * Jeremy Strong

From The Hundred-Mile-an-Hour Dog to karate princesses and hot cross bottoms, there's a Jeremy Strong story to suit every child's sense of humour. Jeremy's readers range from 7 to teen, perfect for fans of Roald Dahl and Andy Stanton.

Streaker the dog is lost. And not just a bit lost, but really lost. It wasn't even her fault! She wanted to protect some pies from the PIE ROBBER and suddenly she's miles from home and two-legged Trevor AND she has to make friends with a cat. A CAT! But it gets a lot HAIRIER when they find themselves face-to-face with a baboon...Will Streaker ever see her beloved pups again? And more importantly, will she ever eat another donut again?


Midnight for Charlie Bone Jenny Nimmo


My Life as a Goldfish And Other Poems Rachel Rooney


Oliver and the Seawigs Philip Reeve


Ottoline and the Yellow Cat Chris Riddell


Stig of the Dump Clive King


Stuart Little E. B. White


The Accidental President Tom McLaughlin


The Adventures of Shola Bernardo Atxaga, Mikel Valverde


The Boy in the Dress David Walliams


The Dancing Bear Michael Morpurgo, M. B. E.


The Firework-maker's Daughter Philip Pullman

The Iron Man Ted Hughes



Crewed by the strangest bunch of pirates you would ever want to meet and captained by the dreaded Idryss Ebeneezer Split (a wolf with a false leg carved from a human thighbone, a rusty cutlass sheathed in his belt and a loaded pistol tucked in his pants with no fear of the consequences), the Feroshus Maggot whisks Mabel Jones off on the adventure of a lifetime.



The Witches <mark>*</mark> Roald Dahl

This is the story of a detestable breed of Witches. Beware. Real witches dress in ordinary clothes and look like ordinary women. But they are not ordinary. They are always plotting and scheming with murderous, bloodthirsty thoughts - and they hate children. The Grand High Witch hates children most of all and plans to make every single one of you disappear. Only one boy and his grandmother can stop her, but if their plan fails the Grand High Witch will frizzle them like fritters, and then what...? good?



Timmy Failure: Mistakes Were Made Stephan Pastis

Perfect for fans of Wimpy Kid and Big Nate, Timmy Failure: Mistakes Were Made is the first book in the New York Times bestselling series. Listed as one of 100 Modern Children's Classics by The Sunday Times, it was also a Booktrust Best Book Awards winner.

Meet Timmy Failure, founder of the best detective agency in town -Total Failure, Inc. With the help of his polar bear, Total, the clueless, comically self-confident Timmy already has plans for world domination. Plans that will make his mother rich and unpaid bills a thing of the past. Two Weeks with the Queen Morris Gleitzman

To writing a moving and funny book, especially for children, about as serious a subject as cancer is a remarkable achievement. *Two Weeks with the Queen* is a remarkable example of such a thing. Sent away from his home in Australia to stay with his aunt and uncle in London while his parents nurse his brother Luke through the final stages of cancer, Colin sets out on a mission. If only he can reach the Queen, he reasons, she'll be able to put him in touch with the best cancer doctor in the world and Luke will be made well. But nothing is so

straightforward. Instead, Colin meets some remarkable people and, through them, he is able to share some of the universal grief of losing a person you love. Profoundly moving, deeply serious but also wickedly funny.



Whale Boy Nicola Davies

Michael, a young boy growing up on the tropical island of Rose Town, has been saving up for his own fishing boat for years. But when a terrible storm wrecks his home, Michael is forced to take a job working for a rich, mysterious newcomer named Spargo. Spargo asks Michael to search for one thing in the deep waters around Rose Town - whales...
