



Reading Suggestions

Key Stage 1

There is a huge range of great fiction for the 5-7 year age range. This lists just a few and many cross year group boundaries. Some may look too young but the length of a book can be deceptive. Some feature more illustration than text: illustration can be as important in the telling of a story as words and will introduce children to key illustrators.

Within class libraries at Queen Edith, KS1 children are banded to allow them to explore both fiction and non-fiction texts at a suitable level. At the core of these bands is the Oxford Reading Tree scheme, but these books have been supplemented by many others (both to provide variety and to avoid an over-reliance on ORT sight words).

There are also plenty of series that are perfect for later KS1 readers, with various good authors writing in the same format, getting children used to books that are not too long but which are of guaranteed quality: Banana Books, Colour Jets (illustrated here), Jets, Seriously Silly Stories, Collins Shivery Storybooks, Corgi Pups, Books for Boys, Sprinters, Young Puffins etc.








Reading Suggestions


If your child is a competent reader or has read all these titles then try the books from the Year 3 list.


Oi Duck-billed Platypus! * Kes Gray


A Child of Books Oliver Jeffers, Sam Winston


Planet Awesome Stacy McAnulty

Only when he meets Cyrus, a creature also frustrated by the size of his neck, does he come to terms with it, making a special friend in the process.




The Day the Crayons Quit *Oliver Jeffers


Poor Duncan just wants to colour in. But when he opens his box of crayons, he only finds letters, all saying the same thing: We


The Very Hungry Caterpillar Eric Carle

This is a much-loved classic but as relevant today as it was when first published in 1969!




Sir Dancealot Timothy Knapman


Dougal's Deep Sea Diary * Simon Bartram


Grandpa Was an Astronaut Jonathan Meres


Paddington Michael Bond


Little Beauty Anthony Browne


Grumpy Cat * Britta Teckentrup


The Dancing Bear Michael Morpurgo


The Enormous Crocodile * Roald Dahl


Beegu Alexis Deacon


Once Upon a Wild Wood Chris Riddell

Once in the wild woods she is in a magical world where even the trees have faces, full of surprising characters. There's a Beast looking for his Beauty, three Bears who are mistrustful of strangers, a talking harp, three little pigs, seven dwarves and many more. Young readers will love both feeling they know the stories being surprised by some of the turns of events.




Tell Me a Dragon Jackie Morris

Everyone has their very own dragon, and this book describes many different varieties of the beast, showing in words and stunning pictures exactly why their owners find them so entrancing. They range from a dragon as big as a village to a tiny dragon with whisper-thin wings, from a snaggle-toothed dragon to a sea-dragon which races dolphins on the waves - ending in a page inhabited by every dragon in the book!

Flat Stanley Jeff Brown

Stanley Lambchop is an ordinary boy with an extraordinary problem. One night, a giant pinboard falls on top of him leaving him completely flat. At first, Stanley enjoys the benefits of his strange predicament - it can be fun going in out of rooms simply by sliding under the door. And it's a hoot being posted to your friends in California for a holiday. But it's not always easy being different, and, once the novelty begins to wear off, Stanley wishes he could be just like everybody else again. But how will he ever fill out? Jeff Brown's world-famous character Flat Stanley continues to charm half a century after he first found his way into print.



Flo of the Somme Hilary Robinson

'Flo Of The Somme' pays tribute to the remarkable bravery of the animals who risked their lives during World War 1. Mercy dog 'Flo' has more to contend with than racing across dangerous battlefields. Can she reach the injured in time with her first aid kit, and can she lead stretcher bearer, Ray, to the stricken. Poignant, poetic text, sensitively written for a young audience with rich illustrations that detail significant landmarks of a battle which is recognised as one of the costliest engagements of World War 1.



The Owls of Blossom Wood * Catherine Coe

A gorgeous animal series set in the beautiful Blossom Wood - where children turn into magical creatures. Katie, Eva and Alex know a secret - when they hide inside a hollow tree trunk at the bottom of Katie's garden, they find themselves whisked away to a magical woods alive with animals, where they're no longer girls but owls! The friends arrive in the wood to find that the bees are on strike. Not only does this mean no honey, it means the flowers, fruits and nuts of the woodland aren't being pollinated! But there's a hidden reason why the bees are striking, and the girls must work it out - and persuade the bees to work again - if they are to save the wood.




I Want My Hat Back Jon Klassen

In his bestselling debut picture book, this is the story of a bear who's hat has gone. And he wants it back. Patiently and politely, he asks the animals he comes across, one by one, whether they have seen it. Each animal says no (some more elaborately than others). But just as it he begins to lose hope, lying flat on his back in despair, a deer comes by and asks a rather obvious question that suddenly sparks the bear's memory and renews his search with a vengeance...Told completely in dialogue, this quirky, hilarious, readaloud tale plays out in sly illustrations brimming with visual humour and winks at the reader who will be thrilled to be in on the joke.




Little Mouse's Big Book of Fears Emily Gravett


Lord of the Forest Caroline Pitcher


Something About a Bear Jackie Morris


Storytime: What's the Time, Wilfred Wolf? Jessica Barrah


The Heart and the Bottle Oliver Jeffers


The Jolley-Rogers and the Ghostly Galleon Jonny Duddle


A First Book of Nature Nicola Davies


Black Dog Levi Pinfold


I am Henry Finch Alexis Deacon, Viviane Schwarz

Journey Aaron Becker




My Big Barefoot Book of Wonderful Words Sophie Fatus

Each scene is teeming with people, places and things. But what makes this book really different is that each of the narrative, real world scenes is followed and further developed by an abstract, interactive one.




Out for the Count Anne Fine


The Cat in the Hat Dr. Seuss


The Dark Lemony Snicket


The Bad Guys * Aaron Blabey


The Django Levi Pinfold


The Emperor of Absurdia Chris Riddell


The Paper Dolls Julia Donaldson




A Hen in the Wardrobe Wendy Meddour


The Dunderheads Paul Fleischman
