Year 1 – Spelling

By the end of Year 1, children are expected to be able to spell...

Words containing each of the phonemes already taught

ai, oi, ay, oy, ar, ee, ea (beach), ea (bread), er, ir, ur, oo (spoon), oo (book), oa, oe, ou, ow (how), ow (show), ue, ew, ie (tie), ie (chief), igh, or, ore, aw, au, air, ear (dear), ear (pear), are (bare)

- + words ending in 'y' e.g. happy, funny, very
- + words containing 'ph' or 'wh' e.g. dolphin, elephant, when, where
- + words using the endings 'ed, ' 'er' or 'ing' where the root word does not change e.g. hunting, hunted, hunter, jumped, jumping, jumper
- + words containing the prefix 'un' e.g. un fair, undo, unhappy
- + compound words e.g. farmyard, playground
